
Food insecurity as a social determinant of health

The cost of the NFB for a family of four in 2023 is \$311.61 per week (\$1349.27 month)




Nutritious Food Basket Income Scenarios

Food insecurity

In Canada, food insecurity rates have increased 14% since 2019 despite dipping during the pandemic

2022

In Ontario, 19% of households were food insecure

2020-2022

17.9% of households were food insecure in WDG

2019

17% of children age1-17 lived in food insecure households in WDG

2022

U of G reported 39.5% of students were food insecure

2023

Food Banks Canada report a 32% increase in food bank usage since March 2022 and 78.5% increase since 2019
